About five years ago when I left for my sabbatical, I told the Session that it was my goal to surpass Rev. Larry Avent and founding pastor Rev. Mac Foust in time served at JPC. In May of 2019 we crossed over the 100,000-meal mark in memory of Fred Werstlein. He was instrumental in bringing this program (then called Stop Hunger Now) to JPC. Consider signing up to be a part of this great day!

Did you know that in the last decade or so we have baptized ten teenagers? Since the Presbyterian Church practices infant baptism this is not normal. In fact, I would be willing to bet that we have baptized more adults and teens in my time here that I have at all the other churches I have served combined. This is a testament to the work of your Christian Education and Youth Programs. The last two confirmation classes had multiple youth say, "I believe in Jesus, and I want to be a part of this community of faith." The result of this was their believer baptism.



Did You Know

Did you know that there's a tax-smart way for traditional IRA owners, aged 70¹/₂ or older, to give to JPC? It's called a **qualified charitable distribution** (QCD). Some of your fellow members at JPC are already using this method!

What is a QCD? - QCDs allow individuals age 70¹/₂ and older to make tax-free donations directly from an IRA to a qualified charity, such as JPC, potentially satisfying all or part of your annual required minimum distribution (RMD). Generally, you can make a QCD from any tax-deferred IRA account, such as a traditional IRA, inherited IRA, SIMPLE IRA, and SEP IRA. However, a direct transfer of a QCD from a SIMPLE or SEP IRA can only be done if the account is inactive, meaning you're no longer contributing to it. That said, the IRS does not allow you to make a charitable contribution from a workplace retirement plan, like a 401(k).

In 2025, you can transfer up to \$108,000 directly from your IRA to JPC. For individuals with more than one IRA, the \$108,000 cap applies per account owner, not per IRA. Spouses who each have an IRA can do their own QCD. You can each give up to \$108,000, provided each of you has substantial amounts in your traditional IRAs.

Because QCDs reduce your RMD, dollar for dollar, they will reduce your 2025 adjusted gross income (AGI) which, along with reducing your income taxes, can help you mitigate surcharges on your 2026 monthly Medicare premiums. The QCD strategy is a good way to get tax savings from charitable gifts for taxpayers who don't itemize because of higher standard deductions. But even if you do itemize on Schedule A, QCDs are a good tax strategy because the distributions don't increase your AGI. Be sure to make all QCDs before taking your remaining RMD for the year for yourself. Also, you cannot deduct the QCD as a charitable contribution on Schedule A.

NOTE: Only transfers of money from your IRA directly to a charity like JPC qualify as QCDs. Most IRA custodians will require you to fill out a form requesting the charitable payout. The custodian will then either send a check directly to JPC or make a check payable to JPC and send it to you for you to mail. You will still need to retain your giving statement from JPC.

There are a few other important QCD rules that you should discuss with your investment advisor and your tax preparer.
