THOUGHTS FROM PASTOR JAY

This week we begin the season of Lent. Lent is a time of preparation and contemplation in preparation for the celebration of the resurrection at Easter. We begin with Ash Wednesday on March 5th. The service is at 6:30PM in the Sanctuary. We will celebrate communion and offer the imposition of ashes. The Season of Lent concludes with Holy Week which of course culminates with the emp-



ty tomb on Easter Sunday! We will once again offer 3 services at Easter. There will be sunrise service in the picnic shelter (no communion) as well as our two normal worship slots, formats, and locations.

As I was thinking about what to say about Lent, I read this excerpt from the Book of Common Worship. Remember the Book of Common Worship is a book full of prayers, liturgies, and information to assist pastors and to offer consistency among churches. Instead of reinventing the wheel I thought I would share this with you. The second paragraph talks about Ash Wednesday specifically.

There is one word I thought I might explain before you get going. That is the word paschal. The dictionary definition is relating to Passover or Easter. For us as Christians, this word means everything associated with Easter. The Paschal story is the story of Jesus during Holy Week. It culminates with the glorious mystery of the resurrection. I hope you find these paragraphs informative and helpful for your Lenten journey.

An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003 110-111)

What we hear during Lent is the power and possibility of the paschal mystery, and that the way of the cross, the way to Easter, is through death. To appropriate the new life that is beyond the power of death means we must die with Christ who was raised for us. To live for Christ, we must die with him. New life requires a daily surrendering of the old life, letting go of the present order, so that we may embrace the new humanity. "I die every day!" asserts Paul (I Corinthians 15:31). Resurrection necessitates death as a preceding act. The church's peculiar Lenten claim is that in dying we live, that all who are baptized into Christ are baptized into his death. To be raised with Christ means one must also die with Christ. In order to embrace the resurrection, we must experience the passion of Jesus. The way of the cross, the way to Easter, is through death of the "old self." In dying, we live.

Therefore, at the beginning of Lent, we are reminded that our possessions, our rulers, our empires, our projects, our families and even our lives do not last forever. "You are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19). The liturgies throughout Lent try to pry loose our fingers, one by one, from presumed securities and plunge us into unknown baptismal waters, waters that turn out to be not only our death tomb but surprisingly our womb of life. Rather than falling back into nothingness, we fall back on everlasting arms. Death? How can we fear what we have already undergone in baptism?

It is the power of the resurrection on the horizon ahead that draws us into repentance toward the cross and tomb. Through the intervention of God's gracious resurrection, lifelong changes in our values and behavior become possible. By turning from the end of the "old self" in us, Lenten repentance makes it possible for us to affirm joyfully, "Death is no more!" and to aim toward the landscape of the new age. Faithfully adhering to the Lenten journey of "prayer, fasting and almsgiving" leads to the destination of Easter.

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During the final week, Holy Week, we hear the fullness of Christ's passion, his death, and resurrection. From Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and on to the Triduum (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday), all of Holy Week focuses on the passion. As his followers, we travel Christ's path of servanthood through the Lord's Supper and the suffering of the cross toward the glory of Easter, all of which underscores the inseparable link between the death and resurrection of Jesus.

It is my prayer that all of us will be drawn to the power of the resurrected Christ this Lenten season. See you in church!

Words for Late Winter from your JPC Community Garden Facilitator

As the facilitator of the Joy House Community Garden and Master Gardener Volunteer, I am happy to offer some advice on planning your own Vegetable Garden. Our JPC vegetable garden is still mostly sleeping but it will soon be a hive of activity!



If you want to have fresh vegetables from your own garden this year, think about how much **space** you have. You can grow edible plants even if you only have pots on your sunny porch! **Sun** is one of

the most important factors in placing and sizing your garden. Find your sunniest spot.

Then make sure you have good **soil**. If you're gardening in pots or raised beds, it is easier to import bagged, prepared garden soil. If you are amending soil in-ground, consider doing a soil test to see what your soil needs regarding Ph. Most of the soil in our area is acidic and consists of a lot of clay. We must add organic matter to keep it healthy for growing plants. Organic matter helps with drainage as well as moisture retention. Add I-2" of compost and till into existing soil each year. In the JPC garden we have two compost piles that provide us with organic matter to add back into our raised beds.

It's not too early to start planting **early spring crops** that can tolerate cold weather such as beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, collards, kale, mustard greens, onions, peas, potatoes, radishes, spinach, turnips. **Summer crops** such as tomatoes and cucumbers must be planted after the last date of expected frost for our area which is April 8.

Once crops are in the ground, they typically need ItoI-I/2" of **water** a week. Plan to supplement if it doesn't rain. **Mulching** will help retain water and control weeds. Watch and **weed** and get ready for your **harvest**! 


show! We will have the Scholastic book fair the night of the Art show! We are enrolling for Fall 2025! Let me know if you need an enrollment form. Looking forward Spring!
